BU East Village Residential Community Workshop No.1 October 19, 2010

Open Forum – Students and Faculty were invited to provide input for the planning of the East Village Residential Community. Nine questions focused on the ideal student community for Baylor were posted on the walls of the Cashion Academic Center 5th Floor Conference Room, one question per Flip Chart. Members of the Design Team and the Advisory Committee recorded the following comments on the flip chart sheets. The items in **bold** type were identified by the Advisory Committee as being essential to the creation of a successful residential community at Baylor.

A. Baylor 2012's Imperative II is to Create a Truly Residential Campus - What characteristics do you feel are embodied by that statement?

- · A place where people want to live for four years. A campus full of small groups of people and meaningful relations and traditions between, and within halls.
- · A truly residential campus will supply students with easy access to food, parking, a supportive community, and comfort.
- · Residents that stay on campus on the weekends
- · Space and environment that gives students a reason to want to be on campus.
- · Living in a community for 4 years being the norm! Building a family feel!
- · Not inviting people to leave campus after freshman year.
- · Faculty involvement.
- · The less you leave campus, the more residential campus will be. Eating and sleeping in assigned spaces is not "truly residential"
- · Having a SLC open 24/7
- · A default area where there will always be something to do. "Town Square"
- A truly residential campus is one that fulfills all student needs and is desirable and comfortable to all ie. quality living environment, sufficient parking, and good quality food.
- · Place where students can enjoy themselves 24/7 and won't become bored.
- · Create an environment in which under and upper classmen like and support one another.
- · Have rooms/halls that are attractive to upper classmen.
- · Provide cost effective opportunities for all students
- · Students have pride for their residential community
- · More students live on campus than off
- · The "in crowd" lives on-campus
- · Majority (or closer to majority) in percentage of students on campus.
- A truly residential campus means students can easily live on campus without being shoved in a closet. I think it is also important to retain our walking campus as well. But it would be incredible if all students at Baylor could live on campus.
- · A place where students can fully experience the Baylor family / community while living on and off campus. Quality living / sufficient parking more organized outside place for meeting.
- · Encouraging students to stay all 4 years.
- · Common space (lounges, study areas, etc.) that allows for student integration.
- A place where students live all 4 years.
- · Have a majority of students living on campus.
- · Spaces for all students to choose on campus living.
- Daily out of the classroom interactions with faculty (relationships)
- · Spread of dorms across the whole campus including the East side.
- · Bigger campus to have "truly residential feel"

- · If research is to be a large focus of the University, graduate students need on-campus housing options.

B. Where on the Baylor Campus do you feel the greatest sense of Baylor's Christian Mission?
