The interior design curriculum is designed to provide the skills, knowledge, and learning experiences that prepare students for professional careers with interior design and architectural firms, other design-related careers, or graduate education. The academic preparation addresses competencies necessary to maintain accreditation through the Council for Interior Design Accreditation (CIDA) and prepares students with the knowledge and skills necessary for passing the National Council for Interior Design Qualification (NCIDQ), the qualifying exam leading to interior design certification and preparation for licensure.

A grade of "C" or better in all family and consumer sciences courses used for the major and a "C" average in courses taken outside the department.

Freshman students declaring interior design as their major field of study should register for FCS 1332 and 1313 their first semester. Interior design courses must be taken in sequence.

A student entering the program after their freshman year or transferring to Baylor with 30 plus hours, please be advised that due to course sequencing and prerequisite requirements, it will take a minimum of three to four additional years to to complete the interior design degree. This is dependent on status of degree upon entering the program.
