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## Baylor welcomes new president

Baylor introduced its new president 3 p.m. Tuesday in Barfield Drawing Room after a 19 month search.

Judge Kenneth Starr will become Baylor's 14th president on June 1, after being unanimously elected by the Board of Regents on Feb. 12.

Starr currently serves as the dean of Pepperdine University in California, and previously served

as both a Court of Appeals judge and Solicitor General. Most notably, he served as Independent Counsel while Bill Clinton was president and was responsible for a number of investigations, including Clinton's extramarital affair with Monica Lewinsky.

On Tuesday, I was unable to attend Starr's introduction in Barfield. Instead, I was outside of the SUB reporting on a story for the Lariat.

A group of students had chosen to protest Starr's appointment as president for a few reasons, includ-

### One thing we have in common

If there's one thing we all have in common, it might be how sleepy we are most of the time. We live a roller-coaster ride climbing up on stress-induced adrenaline, cresting the top of the hill as we meet a deadline, and then plummeting back to exhaustion. It can be thrilling or nauseatingdepending on your preferences and what you last ate for lunch-but even the thrill-lovers among us occasionally wonder if they're making progress or if they're just going in circles.

You may recall that even Jesus' own disciples suffered from heavy eyelids. On the night of his arrest, Jesus is praying fervently, but the Bible says the disciples fell asleep because they were exhausted (Luke 22:45). This isn't the only time the disciples are caught dozing. In Luke 9, we have the Transfiguration story – Jesus glows really bright and two dead prophets show up alive and chatty. The disciples nearly miss this strange event because they have in common what we have in common—they're just plain tired. The text reads, "Peter and his companions were very sleepy, but when they became fully awake, they saw his glory ..." (v.32).

I find this verse fascinating. They were very sleepy, but when they became fully awake, they saw his glory.

Eugene Peterson has commented that reason we get too busy (and thus exceptionally fatigued) is because we are vain—we mistakenly think the overload makes us important. It seems to me that we try to be Christ, and the attempt wears us out. If we weren't so exhausted from the struggle to be in control, we might slow down enough to see Christ. When the disciples wake up, they do not accomplish something as if they are gods themselves. Instead they do something seemingly simple – they see God.

Peter tries to respond to the vision by doing something. "Let's build three shelters!" he cries. But his offer goes virtually unnoticed as the scene is dramatically overtaken by the looming presence of God. His eager but misguided enthusiasm is quickly silenced. And if you're wondering how building shelters was remotely relevant, well, you're thinking the same thing as the biblical author. Humorously, the next line of the text says, "He [Peter] did not know what he was saying." In other words, poor Peter would have been better off if he had just kept his mouth shut and his eyes open.

What if you and I slowed down or even brought the roller-coaster to a grinding halt? Would we finally be able to see?

May it be said of us: "We were very sleepy, but when we became fully awake, we saw His glory..."


I left the theatre happy, and felt my money was well spent. It is a must see, and I hope there's a sequel in its future.
