Student assistants (at left) prepared the Armstrong JFK research material for digitization, by dividing the 39 original notebooks into 112 smaller white binders (see below) needed for the Electronic Library personnel to use the book scanner. Each of the more

than 1,000 notebook tabs created by the Poage students, provided the dividing points for converting the scans into PDFs. The Electronic Library students divided the scans and created the PDFs. The individual PDFs were described and uploaded by Sushmi Chakraborty in CONTENTdm, the software used to organize the material for online access.
