Glory Road

Last Monday, I stepped onto the airplane and made the turn to go up the aisle to my seat. The line was long and slow moving, so there was time to see the folks seated in first class and to wonder how it would be to sit at the front of the plane. As I was looking around, I noticed a man wearing an orange baseball cap with Texas Western stitched on it.

I caught his eye and smiled, saying, "I like your hat."

"You do?" he responded, adding, "Thank you." I told him how much I enjoyed the story of the Miners taking on the Wildcats in one of the greatest college basketball games ever played. (The new movie Glory Road is the story of the team.)

I asked him if he had seen the movie. He had.

I asked him if he liked it. He did, but then he added, "There are a few things that weren't exactly as I would have written them, but it is a great story." Then he lifted his hand to show me his 1966 NCAA championship ring, proudly worn by this gentle man.

To myself I am thinking, "UNBELIEVABLE!" Here was a player on that team. One of the seven African-Americans who risked so much, endured so much, and achieved so much.

He extended his hand, "Willie Cager, nice to meet you."

"Dub Oliver, the pleasure is all mine."

I hadn't seen the movie at that point; we went to see it yesterday. I was determined to find Willie Cager in the movie so that I could understand more about someone I had had a chance encounter with. If you haven't seen the movie, it won't spoil it for you to say that Willie Cager was the heart of the team. In him, the heart of a champion.

It's humbling to think of the men like Willie Cager and so many other men and women like him who blazed trails, who made our country better, who helped open the way for so many to come after them. And we must continue to stand up and speak up about injustice and inequality in our country, in our state, and at our University.

I happened to meet Willie Cager on an airplane, and his story has helped renew me for this important work.

RESIDENTIAL TECHNOLOGY--DID YOU KNOW?

- Free technical support is provided to all oncampus residents through the Resnet Support Center. Located in Martin Hall, the Resnet Support Center is staffed 50 hours per week by 12 student Residential Technology Advisors (RTAs).
- The Resnet Support Center provides support for more than just computers and the Resnet network: printers, scanners, software, hardware installation, multimedia problems, iPods, webcams, cable TV, telephones, viruses, spyware, PDAs...if it's technology related, the RTAs will fix it!
- Next business day in-room appointments are provided to residents if their problem can't be resolved over the telephone.
- In fall 2005, 4,175 computers were registered on the Resnet network, and 2,759 calls were logged by the Resnet Support Center.
- On-campus residents have their own version of the ITS down line. Residents can call 292-RUUP 24-hours a day to check on the status of the Resnet network.
- Residents can checkout laptops from the front desks of Alexander, Allen, Brooks, Dawson, Kokernot, Memorial, and North Village. Laptops can be checked out for a period of four hours at a time, used on both the wireless AirBear or wired Resnet networks, and students can print from the laptops to the printers at each front desk. All laptops have the same software as general computer facilities, such as Moody Library's computer lab. By fall 2006, all residence halls will offer laptop checkout!

BAYLOR RISING ARTISTS NETWORK

The Baylor Rising Artist Network is a network of students who love music and love performing. Membership is open to any student by filling out the registration form at www.baylor.edu/bran. The website features student profiles, information about upcoming performances, a list of resources available to BRAN registered students, and much more. BRAN will be hosting a free Rising Artists Workshop in the Baylor Panhellenic Chapel on January 19 and 20 from 6-8 p.m. Students will come and discuss how to develop their musical career, including helpful tips on touring, the recording process, publishing, record labels, and more.
