Faculty Research Investment Program Has Been Extended

Availability of funds has allowed the Faculty Research Investment Program to be extended for yet another award cycle. **The deadline is November 1, 2003.**

Coordinated by the Office of the Vice Provost for Research, the Faculty Research Investment Program is designed to stimulate research/creative activities and enhance the ability of faculty to compete for external research funds. As such, these funds (at least \$10,000 but not more than \$25,000) are primarily used to: (1) purchase equipment or update existing research equipment; (2) aid faculty members in establishing research/creative activity programs that will be competitive for significant external grants; (3) promote multidisciplinary research/creative activities; and (4) provide "seed" support for productive faculty members wanting to redirect their scholarly activity within their current area or initiate investigations into new and emerging areas.

Baylor Announces Faculty Research Investment Awardees

The first round of Faculty Research Investment Program funds was recently presented. Awardees for the September deadline included: Dr. Kevin Pinney's Novel Serotonin Reuptake Inhibitors for Autism Treatment, Dr. Bob Kane's Mechanistic Studies of Photochemical Tissue-Bonding Agents, Dr. Joa-Ann Tsang's Gratitude and the Moral Motive: Does Gratitude Lead to Prosocial Resciprocation and Dr. Owen Lind and Dr. Laura Lind for postdoctoral support related to Zooplankton and Bacterioplankton control of phytoplankton biomass along a trophic gradient. Additional funding recipients will be announced after the November 1 deadline.

Postdoctoral Program Awardees Announced

Recipients of the postdoctoral fellowship awards through the <u>Baylor Postdoctoral Program</u> were recently announced and included Drs. Kevin Pinney, Robert Kane, and Mary Lynn Trawick; Drs. Kevin Chambliss, Bryan Brooks, and Peter Van Walsum; and Dr. Terrill Saxon.

The University, through the Office of the Vice Provost for Research, supports 12-month postdoctoral research fellowships for Ph.D. granting departments. These postdoctoral research fellowships are funded by the University and have minimal teaching responsibility. Salaries are competitive at a national level. The initial appointments are funded for a period of one year, with application for a second year extension allowed for successful fellows. Candidates must hold a Ph.D. degree and be committed to excellence in research at both the undergraduate and graduate levels.

NSF Reaffirms Revised Cost Sharing Policy

As of April 1, 2003, NSF proposal writers at Baylor should conform to instructions in the NSF Important Notice No. 128 issued on January 24, 2003. The notice reiterated the NSF's commitment to a transparent cost sharing policy and altered some application procedures specifically pertaining to cost-sharing. NIH Roadmap to Revamp Research Procedures, Goals, Grants

In a move to transform the nation's medical research capabilities and speed the movement of research discoveries from the bench to the bedside, National Institutes of Health (NIH) Director Elias A. Zerhouni, M.D. has laid out a series of far-reaching initiatives known collectively as the NIH Roadmap for Medical Research. The NIH Roadmap builds on the tremendous progress in medical research achieved, in part, through the recent doubling of the NIH budget. In setting forth an ambitious vision for a more efficient and productive system of medical research, the NIH Roadmap focuses on the most compelling opportunities in three main areas: new pathways to discovery, research teams of the future and re-engineering the clinical research enterprise.

To be part of the NIH Roadmap, scientific initiatives had to be deemed of high potential impact, had to enhance the disease and mission-specific activities of all of NIH's 27 institutes and centers, and had to respond to the needs and concerns of the public. The NIH will begin to implement all of the initiatives in fiscal year 2004. For more information, visit the NIH Roadmap website or the NIH website.
