You know about the Immortal Ten. We are thrilled that this project – one that students worked so hard on – is finally complete. The dedication ceremony a couple of weeks ago was a special memory for all gathered there.

It was such an encouragement to see students standing at the memorial after the bonfire telling their parents and family members the story of the men who lost their lives 80 years ago. As they tell the story and walk by the memorial we hope they will remember how precious life is; how important this community is; how beautiful friendship is; how faith, hope, and love remain.

There's another memorial in Traditions Square that you may not know about. It isn't as large, but it is important and powerful. It's a simple red granite memorial lamppost. This memorial is a tribute to the first African American graduate of Baylor University – Rev. Robert Louis Gilbert. Friends of Rev. Gilbert collected the money to place this memorial, and it's placement in Traditions Square is completely appropriate. Traditions Square is a place we remember, and Robert Gilbert lived a faithful life worth remembering.

Most of us truly don't understand what things were like 40 years ago in the United States, and in the South, and at Baylor for students of color. The Civil Rights Act had been passed, but changing laws and changing people's hearts are two totally different matters. And into this racially charged environment walked a young man determined to do what had not been done before. John Drake, in a *Lariat* editorial in 2002 remarked, "Despite untold internal and external pressures for this young freedom fighter, Robert Gilbert remained steadfast and made possible what seemed implausible for a black person in the '60s: he earned a degree from Baylor University."

Robert Gilbert made the way for thousands of other young people to be able to study and live and learn at Baylor. I hope that the next time you're walking with a student or colleague by Traditions Square, you'll take the time to stop and tell them the story of Robert Gilbert. Be encouraged by his admonition, "No excuses accepted."
