Abstract Guidelines

Faculty authors should submit abstracts electronically to Prof. Jim Farison at: <u>Jim Farison@baylor.edu</u>. Abstracts should be 250-300 words. Submitting a paper and its acceptance commits the author to attending and presenting at the conference. These papers are to focus on engineering education.

Graduate authors should submit abstracts electronically to Prof. Mike Thompson at: <u>Michael Thompson@baylor.edu</u>. Abstracts should be 250-300 words. Submitting a Graduate Student Technical Paper and its acceptance commits the graduate student to attending and presenting at the conference. Indicate in your submission that it is a graduate paper and that the first author is a graduate student. These papers are primarily of a technical nature.

Undergraduate authors should submit abstracts electronically to Prof. Ken Van Treuren at: <u>Kenneth Van Treuren@baylor.edu</u>. Abstracts should be 250-300 words. Submitting an Undergraduate Student Technical Paper and its acceptance commits the student to attending and presenting at the conference. Indicate in your submission that it is an undergraduate paper and that the first author is an undergraduate student. These papers are primarily of a technical nature.

Abstract Only Submission

If you would like to participate, but cannot meet the paper submission deadlines, you can present your talk on engineering education and have only your abstract published in the proceedings. Note that you will still be required to register for the conference and submit an abstract by the abstract deadline (see registration info below and in another link). When submitting your abstract, please indicate that it is an abstract *only* submission.

Abstract only submissions have to be in regard to engineering education and not of pure technical nature. Abstract only submissions are only accepted from non-student co-authors.

Submission of Full Papers

See the <u>Author's Kit</u> for formatting guidelines. Only authors of accepted abstracts can submit full manuscripts for review. Papers will be accepted on the basis of peer review. Accepted papers will be published in the conference proceedings on a CD. Final papers must be submitted via email (PDF or MS Word format only) to the following individuals:

Student Technical Papers

ASEE-GSW is also seeking undergraduate and graduate student technical papers in any engineering discipline. The e-mail message accompanying the submission of a student abstract/paper should clearly indicate that the principal author is a student (since papers of a purely technical nature will not be accepted from non-students). The lead/first author on Student Technical Paper(s) needs to be a student. Other co-authors can be faculty members, staff, other students, or other professionals. Also, students participating in the conference with a student technical paper(s) *will have to* present their paper(s) in a Student Technical Paper Session *in order to* compete for the Best Student Paper Awards.

Registration Requirements

In order to make a presentation and have your paper (or abstract) appear in the proceedings CD, your registration fee must be paid by the March 2, 2009 deadline.
