Browning Day to be Held May 7, 2009

Browning Day! The very sound of it implies poetry and music. This annual celebration of the collective birthdays of Robert and Elizabeth Barrett Browning and the Armstrong Browning Library's founder, Dr. A. J. Armstrong, provides a venue for patrons to catch up on what has been happening at the Library and to reconnect with each other.

Thursday, May 7, at 2:30 pm, Michael Meredith, Curator of the Modern Collections at Eton College, will speak on the topic "Robert Browning and the Actors." Meredith is currently sketching out ideas for a new book, provisionally called The Hidden Browning, which will include a chapter on Browning and the theater. The book will deal with areas of the poet's life that have been neglected so far by biographers. "I think RB will come out of it as far less confident and certain of himself than he often seemed in public, much more emotional and complex," said Meredith. "The lecture is my first attempt to come to terms with this."

When asked about his reason for accepting the invitation to be this year's Browning Day lecturer, Meredith replied: "Because the ABL is the most marvelous place to be, and I always love my stays there. This will be my third lecture, and my eighth visit since I first came to Baylor in the late 60s. That was in mid-summer and Dr. Herring [ABL director] was on vacation. He had locked up all the cabinets containing EBB's and RB's letters and hidden the key. Luckily there was so much else to see and to read that I fell in love with the library and the university. It has been fascinating to see it grow and prosper over the years."

Meredith has had a long career at Eton as head of English, housemaster and college librarian. During his time as librarian, he built up a large collection of 19th- and 20th-century rare books, letters and manuscripts, which includes some of

Elizabeth Barrett Browning's family papers. As a collector, mainly of Robert Browning and his friends, Meredith is a member of the Roxburghe Club and the Grolier Club of New York. He is the general editor of The Poetical Works of Robert Browning, published by Oxford University Press, and is co-editor of volume 15, Parleyings and Asolando, which is to be released this year. He has written extensively on the Brownings, and he is about to complete his third term as president of the Browning Society of London.

The ABL has enjoyed a long friendship with Eton College. In 1983, at the suggestion of Meredith, Eton's Provost and Fellows donated to ABL a plaster reproduction of an original bust of the poet Percy Bysshe Shelley (1792 – 1822). Eton commissioned the copy during the WWII bombing raids so the original could be put away for safekeeping. The original bust, also in plaster, was created from memory by Marianne Hunt, wife of Leigh Hunt, in 1836, and was given to Browning by his writer friend, Thomas Carlyle. Shelley was the first major influence upon the young Browning who emulated him for a short time. In more recent years, ABL reciprocated Eton's generosity by permanently loaning to their library one of the original copies of the bronze Clasped Hands of the Brownings created by Harriet Hosmer in 1853.

In addition to Meredith's lecture, Browning Day will also feature music by Salvadoran-born composer Carlos Colón. A reception will follow in the Cox Reception Hall. The event is free and open to the public.

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Collections: A Partnership with Patrons

As a library of record, the Armstrong Browning Library strives to collect all things related to Robert and Elizabeth Barrett Browning. Rita Patteson, Curator of Manuscripts and Interim Director of the ABL, said that the primary strategy for collecting is, "Buy everything we can!" Since most remain in private hands or institutions, Browning items show up at auctions with increasing rarity. When the really good ones come along, the ABL wastes no time.

In October 2008, a notice from Chris Coover, an English literature specialist at Christie's auction house in New York, caught the attention of scholars, librarians and collectors worldwide interested in Elizabeth Barrett Browning, by stating: "I am truly delighted to report that an extensive EBB manuscript album, sold in 1913 in the London dispersal of the Browning Collections . . . has resurfaced after some 95 years in the shadows." Immediately, the ABL staff determined the notebook was an essential item for Baylor University and soon gained the support of VP/Dean Pattie Orr. Thanks to the Margaret Cox Endowment, the notebook was purchased at a Christie's auction on December 5, 2008.

Written in 1839, the marble-edged notebook contains a hand-written title-page, "MSS. By Elizabeth Barrett," and 68 pages of verse, written mostly on rectos (the front sides of a book's pages), with added or reworked verses on some of the versos (the back, or reverse, sides of a book's pages)—all in a blank book of 117 pages of wove paper, housed in a dark blue morocco pull-off box, by Sangorski & Sutcliffe. This remarkable and extensive concentration of Elizabeth Barrett Browning's early mature verse contains drafts and working manuscripts of 15 poems, with one series of nine sonnets. It offers unique drafts of works whose texts differ from published versions or that are partly unpublished and four wholly unpublished poems.

The Library depends on gifts and endowments to make possible such acquisitions of rare and exquisite materials. More commonly, though, patrons are able to serve as extra eyes and ears for the Library through their connections with people, collections and institutions. Recently, a member of the Fano Club became aware of a New Orleans auction that was selling items of special interest to the Library and notified Patteson. "Are you interested?" she asked. Patteson replied, "Of course!" Patrons can also assist by spreading the word about what the ABL collects and attending events that keep them connected to the Library and other patrons.


