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Executive Summary

The Academic Connections project is an initiative of the Academic Integration Work Team in Student Life. The team works to deepen our understanding of how to integrate our work so that there is a seamless learning experience while establishing an environment where learning can flourish. At the onset of the committee, it was determined that a broader understanding of the partnerships, programs, and connections to faculty and academic programs was pertinent to further collaboration. In all, we found that significant academic work both in scope and depth was being facilitated throughout the Division of Student Life. Summarizations of some of these findings are listed below. Our hope is to continue to make significant connections with various academic areas and faculty while contributing information that facilitates greater appreciation for and contributions to Student Life.

- 40 formalized partnerships serving from/ to various academic departments
- 24 Academic Courses taught by or through Division of Student Life personnel
- 29 faculty serve as Greek Organization Advisors •
- 390 (predominantly faculty) serve as Student Organization Advisors •
- 9 faculty live in-residence in living-learning programs or centers
- 30+ faculty are highly involved with Living-Learning Centers on a weekly basis •
- 100 Faculty Partners: Faculty who partner with a Community Leader and his/her residents for the academic year to • increase student-faculty interaction outside the classroom
- 37 Faculty Partners participated on Move-In Day with another 150 faculty volunteers (450-500 staff volunteers) •

New Student Orientation (New Student Programs)

- The academic introduction to the university for all incoming students faculty from various departments around campus participates as presenters for academic major sessions, student success, etc. Before Orientation begins, the Director of New Student Programs meets with each of the Associate Deans in each of the schools to ensure a smooth and seamless process for new students.

Baylor Line Camp (New Student Programs)

- A five day, four night on-campus experience open to all incoming students the four cornerstones of Baylor Line Camp is friendship, service, calling and strengths, and tradition. These overarching ideas are woven into the curriculum at Line Camp and are designed to help students begin thinking about how they want to make an impact in and beyond their college years. Students are encouraged to think deeply about these themes through small group discussion and guided reflection.
- Curriculum/Speakers
 - New Student Programs works with faculty and staff on the curriculum for Baylor Line Camp. Faculty
 participants have served as presenters for the conversations regarding friendship and calling during the Line
 Camp experience (College of Arts and Sciences).
 - The Vice President for Information Technology and Dean of Libraries has taken a vested interest in the trip that Baylor Line Camp takes to Independence, TX. Through this experience, New Student Programs educates incoming students on the history and traditions of Baylor University.

Welcome Week (New Student Programs)

- A program to introduce the educational ideal of balanced development of the whole person in the Christian atmosphere of Baylor University, to acquaint students with Baylor and its traditions, and to welcome each new student as a significant member of the life and family of the University.
 - Convocation
 - Convocation marks the beginning of the academic journey for new students. New Student Programs coordinates with departments across campus to organize and facilitate this special tradition.
 - Partners Include: College of Arts and Sciences, Hankamer School of Business, Honors College, Louise Herrington School of Nursing, School of Education, School of Engineering and Computer Science, School of Music, School of Social Work
 - Academic Open Houses
 - Colleges, Schools, and Departments from all around campus welcome students to the Baylor community during Welcome Week. Students are encouraged to check out their academic interests and meet the faculty and staff who will partner with them through their academic journey.

 - Students are encouraged to participate with their Welcome Week group into the home/residential restaurant for dinner with their University/BU 1000 instructor. This program facilitates discussion in an informal setting with faculty from across the University.

Faculty in Residence (FIR) (Campus Living and Learning)

- Faculty members living in apartments located within the residence halls to further Baylor's commitment to integrating learning in and out of the classroom
- Nine faculty representing School of Engineering and Computer Science, School of Education, English, the Graduate School, Great Texts, History, Music, Social Work, and Theatre
- Currently housed in six halls

Engaged Learning Groups (ELGs) (Campus Living and Learning)

- Academically and socially nurturing, residentially-based learning communities that explore important interdisciplinary topics with a team of faculty members for at least three semesters
- Part of Baylor University's Quality Enhancement Plan (QEP) to strengthen scholarly engagement and to enhance research experiences for our undergraduates
- In 2008-09, 16 faculty serving in 6 programs with 9 departments represented: Baylor Interdisciplinary Core, Hankamer School of Business, Communication Studies, School of Education, English, Journalism, Modern Foreign Language, Religion, Theatre

Living-Learning Centers (LLCs) (Campus Living and Learning)
