

# THIS WE BELIEVE

Baptists are people of the Book. The Bible is the rule and guide for our faith and practice. We have a Baptist Faith and Message, but it is not a creed. No one has to sign it; no one is forced to subscribe to it. It is simply a statement of what Baptists generally believe.

We claim no creed but the Bible. Several years ago Richard Jackson gave me a Bible that had embossed on the front of it in gold letters, "The Baptist Faith and Message." He had it right.

Southern Baptists had no statement of faith at all in their first 80 years of existence, from their inception in 1845 until the formation of the Cooperative Program in 1925. In 1925, after much debate, the convention narrowly approved its initial statement of faith. In 1963, a few minor word changes were made, and it served as a guide until the takeover of the convention. In 2000, it was altered more radically and became an instrument of "doctrinal accountability." Missionaries and employees of Baptist institutions were required to either sign it or resign. That requirement was tantamount to making it a creed, regardless of what people say, and is contrary to historical Baptist practices.

The fact that we have never had a creed does not mean that a person can believe anything and still be a Baptist. Our creed is the Bible, and we gladly subscribe to it. In fact, I have signed every page of my Bible.

We believe with the apostle Paul that "All Scripture (every single part of the whole) is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness: that the man of God may be perfect, thoroughly furnished into all good works" (2 Timothy 3:16-17). At Truett we stand on the authority of scripture. Don't believe anyone who tells you otherwise.

The Rev. Eugene Peterson, professor emeritus of spiritual theology at Regent College, presented three lectures in October for the 2005 Parchman Lecture Series under the theme, Follow the Leader: Discernments in the Way of Jesus.

- Religion is one of the best cover-ups for sin there is (speaking of Caiaphas, the high priest who sought to have Jesus put to death).
- The devil often does some of his best work behind stained glass windows.
- Jesus wasn't after the best, but the worst. He came not to call the righteous, but sinners, to repentance.
- Jesus didn't call the rich, the powerful or the religious and wound up with a bunch of losers who wound up being saints.
- The American way is not the Jesus way. I love the American way but it is not God's way. America's way is not the same as the Kingdom of God.

Dr. Peterson, a recognized authority on spiritual theology, is the author of 27 books, including *The Message* paraphrase translation of the Bible, and *Five Smooth Stones for Pastoral Work*.

- Kirby Godsey, retiring after 27 years as president of Mercer University, was asked how he survived the presidency that long. (The average tenure for higher education presidents is now about five years at public universities and about seven years at private universities, according to the American Council on Education.) He replied, "Don't get crucified on six-inch crosses." Every leader must choose his/her battles well. Some things aren't worth dying over. Don't get nailed for little things when there are big issues at stake.
- Scott Podsednik of the Chicago White Sox hit the winning homerun in the ninth inning of the second game of the 2005 World Series on October 23. Amazingly, Podsednik, who hails from West, Texas (near Waco), did not hit a single homerun in 507 regular-season at-bats for the year, although he has 22 career regular-season homeruns and it was his second homerun of the postseason. The moral is never give up. In the words of Winston Churchill, "Never give up. Never! Never! Never! Never!" The next time up you may knock it out of the park.
- Michelle Wie, a 16-year-old who made her debut as a professional golfer on October 7, 2005, was disqualified for signing an incorrect scorecard at the Samsung World Championship. The events unfolded after Wie apparently had finished fourth in her pro debut, but then a reporter questioned Wie's ball drop on the seventh hole in the third round. According to Wie, she mistakenly dropped the ball three inches closer to the hole, and the error cost her \$53,126 or \$17,909 an inch in prize money.

The Scriptures warn that "Little foxes can spoil the vines" (Song of Solomon 2:15). Watch the little things. They can provide big openings through which Satan gains a foothold in our lives.
