Districts across the United States responded to a survey reporting the percent of their student enrollment determined to be eligible for free and reduced-price meals through the National School Lunch Program.

These eligibility figures provide a snapshot of the relative level of poverty and nutritional need.

The highest rate of 86.4 percent was in Dallas, Texas.

Children from families with incomes at or below 130 percent of the federal poverty line receive school meals for free. In 2009, that was \$28,665 for a family of four.

Children from families with incomes between 130 percent and 185 percent of the poverty line receive school meals at a reduced price – no more than 30 cents for breakfast.

All other participating students, officially designated as receiving "paid" meals, pay most of the cost for their breakfast, often approximately \$1.15.

Almost one-in-five Texas households (18.8 %) are food insecure, and over one-in-four (28 %) children live in households that struggle to afford food.

Texas ranks ninth highest in the country for child food insecurity, with more than 1.7 million children in the state at risk of hunger and a 25.7% Child Poverty Rate

Of the more than 2.4 million students in the state who get a free or reducedprice lunch at school, less than 1.4 million (56 percent) participate in the School Breakfast Program.
