The mission of Baylor University is to educate men and women for worldwide leadership and service by integrating academic excellence and Christian commitment within a caring community.

Baylor enrollment typically includes students from all 50 states, the District of Columbia, and approximately 85 foreign countries.

Library holdings include 1.5 million bound volumes as well as numerous periodicals, microforms, government documents, and audiovisual materials.

As of May 31, 1999, the University endowment market value was approximately \$587 million. Approximately 75% of Baylor students receive student financial assistance.

The curriculum includes 158 baccalaureate programs, 71 master's programs, and 15 doctoral programs. In addition, the Education Specialist degree is offered by the School of Education, the Juris Doctor degree is offered by the School of Law, and the Master of Divinity and the Doctor of Ministry are offered by the Truett Seminary.

Baylor is one of the select 11% of U.S. colleges and universities with a Phi Beta Kappa chapter.

83% of entering freshmen return to Baylor for their second year.

Graduation rates: Recent studies indicate that approximately 70% of an entering class of freshmen proceed to graduate from the University.
