CHALLENGES

- •On their own. As students start out, the temptations are great: to eat only junk food, stay up all hours of the night, miss class or waste time watching TV or surfing the Internet. Conversely, homesick students may call home frequently as they adjust to making their own decisions.
- •Campus life. Students should maintain constant communication with roommates to preserve a good relationship and seek advice from community leaders if discomfort arises.

- •Wellness. The McLane Student Life Center is an excellent facility which houses not only exercise equipment but also the Health Center and Counseling Center, helping students maintain good habits and stay healthy.
- •Orientation sessions. Informational meetings are offered that can teach your student how to use the libraries, Blackboard software and other resources.
- •Involvement. Tell students to keep an eye out for any academic, social or service organizations they might be interested in joining. Also, Student Life puts on Place 2 BU weekend events, as well as other activities, providing opportunities to meet new people.

CHALLENGES

- •Mid-terms. This first round of exams can be daunting, especially for freshmen who excelled easily in high school and find college to be a different ballgame.
- •Advising and registration. Make sure students know their registration dates for spring classes and plan accordingly to meet with academic advisors and to clear up any holds that might prevent them from registering.

- •Tutoring. The Paul L. Foster Success Center offers tutoring, both one-on-one and through Smarthinking, an online program. Many academic departments also offer tutoring, and the English department offers a Writing Center open to all majors. In addition, Supplemental Instruction, weekly study sessions for historically challenging courses, are often available for freshman level courses.
- •School/social balance. Classes are the focus of Baylor life, which some students need to be reminded of, while others neglect their personal life. The trick is keeping a balance between school, work and social activities.

CHALLENGES

- •Planning ahead. At the end of the semester, deadlines for reading assignments, major projects and term papers lead straight into final exams, which begin just one week into December. Students should start preparing early.
- •Health. This is the time of year that the Health Center has the most visits, as overwhelmed students are more prone to illness. Maintaining a proper diet and sleep schedule helps students perform their best at this busy time of year.

- •Talking to professors. Professors have office hours for students to discuss questions and concerns about class performance. Keeping an open dialogue with professors often can make a difference if a final grade is on the cusp.
- •Decision-making. Listen to your students as they consider everything from holiday travel plans to choosing a major. Offer support as they go through their reasoning process, but let them form their own decisions.
- •Verify exam schedule. Final exams are not necessarily given at the same time a class meets. Knowing the schedule aids in making end-of-semester travel plans.

CHALLENGES

- •Studying. With holidays approaching, focusing on calculus or world history can be difficult. If professors offer review sessions, students should take advantage.
- •Loss of freedom. Having become accustomed to their own routine and schedule, there may be conflict when students want to stay out late or neglect chores over the holiday break.

- •McLane Student Life Center services. Being healthy, emotionally and physically, is key to good performance on final exams. A massage may be just the ticket to relaxing for finals, or perhaps Bearobics, a variety of aerobics classes ranging from kickboxing to yoga, which is free during finals.
- •Where to live next year? Yes, it is early—but housing, both on-campus and off, gets snapped up quickly. Students need to decide whether they will live in a residence hall or move into an apartment. Registration to live on-campus starts now.

CHALLENGES

- •Rush and pledging. Though usually a rewarding experience, joining a fraternity or sorority is time-consuming and often stressful when balancing new social commitments with academics.
- •Financial aid. From scholarships to work-study, there is a plethora of financial aid options. Don't forget FAFSA—it should be filed as soon as the prior year's income tax return is prepared.

Encourage

- •Study abroad. Baylor offers a variety of study abroad programs, ranging from teaching in Australia to studying in Maastricht. If considering a summer program, students should start making plans now.
- •Career guidance. Whether undecided or simply wondering what careers certain majors lead to, Career Counseling helps guide students down the right path. And for students seeking internships or jobs, Career Services is the place to go, where students can get help with resume writing, job fairs and on-campus interviews.

CHALLENGES

- •**Prioritizing**. As students take on new activities or leadership roles, they must learn to prioritize and balance these responsibilities with their classes, while avoiding over-commitment.
- •Valentine's Day. Regardless of your student's relationship status, Valentine's Day can be stressful, whether feeling the pressure of financing the perfect date or feeling lonely without a significant other.

- •Asking for help. Sometimes figuring out how to manage time or solve problems goes beyond one person's abilities. The Counseling Center, University Ministries and the Paul L. Foster Success Center are some helpful resources for students.
- •Family time. While staying aware of your student's time limitations, be available. If a family visit to campus can be planned (with your student's input), that support means a lot. If a visit is not feasible, keep up via phone calls and e-mail.



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

CHALLENGES

- •Spring break. Communicate with students about plans, whether they will travel with friends or come home. Encourage them to think through their choices about spring break activities.
- •Finalizing summer plans. Students must decide whether they will intern, study abroad, return home or stay at Baylor and whether they will work, take classes or enjoy one last lazy summer. If your student plans to attend classes at a hometown university or community college, make sure the credits will transfer to Baylor.

- •Focus. Encourage students not to procrastinate when studying—it is hard to focus with a weeklong vacation coming up, but they will not enjoy the break as much if they feel badly about exam results.
- •Service. Volunteering is a great way to feel a part of the community. Steppin' Out, a Baylor volunteer initiative, is at the end of this month, and there are numerous service organizations on campus, as well as opportunities for mission trips.

- •Positive attitude. Even if this semester's classes were particularly difficult, remind your student to keep a positive view as they head into finals. All anybody can ask is that they do their best.



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

CHALLENGES

- •Finals and goodbyes. While coping with the academic rigor of final exams, at the same time students say goodbye to friends as they part ways for the summer.
- •Facing the future. Whether your student is a freshman nervous about a first internship or a graduating senior preparing to start a career, the end of the school year means big changes.

- •Moving-out preparation. While packing, students should be aware of residence hall check-out procedures or completing their apartment lease requirements, and they need to make address changes with both the postal service and in university records.

CHALLENGES

- •Responsibility vs. fun. Students who have a job or take summer classes may have a hard time balancing summer fun and responsibilities, especially if this is the first summer they won't get to kick back and relax.
- •Separation from friends. Students get used to living in very close proximity to the college friends, so being separated is a big adjustment. They may want to visit college friends during the summer.
