Description of HON 3V70 classes

HON 3V70-01, History of Disenchantment Alan Jacobs, instructor

The sociologist Max Weber wrote that "The fate of our times is characterized by rationalization and, above all, by **the disenchantment of the world.**" The purpose of this course is to explore--through philosophy, history, and fiction--Weber's thesis. Is it correct? If so, what are its consequences? What strategies have we formed to break through this disenchantment? And if Weber's thesis is not right, in what forms has an enchanted world persisted?

HON 3V70-03, US Healthcare System Bill Neilson, instructor

This class is intended to introduce the student to the current state of health care in the United States. The first several weeks of the course will be devoted to learning how the US health care system currently functions. Subsequent weeks will focus on the economic impact of health care, ideas for health care reform, and issues regarding quality and patient safety.

HON 3V70-04, Marriage and Civil Society David and Elizabeth Corey, instructors

Marriage and Civil Society, co-taught by Drs. David and Elizabeth Corey, will focus on the way the essence of marriage has been understood historically by philosophers and theologians and on the possible effects on American civil society of a more or less healthy marriage culture. The core text for the class will be Amy and Leon Kass's reader, *Wing to Wing, Oar to Oar*.
