

## Additional Campus Tips and Resources

### Tips

- Students can use their Baylor email to gain access to the Facebook “Free & For Sale” page. This was created by students for students to sell textbooks, furniture, and other materials.
- The Baylor Class Confessions Facebook page offers students from underrepresented socioeconomic backgrounds (classes) a chance to share their voice and to encourage community support.
- Students receive a free 6 month Prime membership from Amazon if they use their university email
- Baylor University’s office of Career & Professional Development has created the Career Closet, a resource of new/ gently used casual and business professional attire, free of charge, to all currently enrolled Baylor University students. - Many students who work part-time, on-campus jobs are eligible for food stamps through SNAP and/or TNAF (<https://yourtexasbenefits.hhsc.texas.gov/programs/snap>)
- The Baylor Parents Network Student Emergency Fund (SEF) was created through the generosity of parent-donors to provide emergency or unexpected financial assistance to students who, without this, would not be able to complete their current semester at Baylor University. SEF is designed to meet a short-term financial need, with the maximum being \$1000 annually per student. - The Baylor bookstore has a price matching system for textbooks. If you find a book in Barnes and Nobles, Amazon, or Chegg (no third-parties from these websites accepted), that is cheaper than the one in the bookstore then the bookstore will offer you a gift card for the difference
