TEACHING / INSTRUCTIONAL EXPERIENCE

Teacher of Record, HIS 1300: The United States in Global Perspective, Baylor University (Fall 2021): I am currently teaching a freshman- and sophomore-level core course on U.S. history in global perspective; my iteration of the course is subtitled “Green and Gold Afar” and uses the history of higher education in general and Baylor in particular as a window into larger national and international historical events.

Graduate Assistant for Dr. Andrea L. Turpin, Baylor University (2018–2019): I graded for History of the American Woman since 1865 and Women’s and Gender History, and did research for an extensive historiographical essay on the history of religion in American higher education that Dr. Turpin was writing.
